**Re Principal Corners and Posts.**

In determining the number of corners to be marked with the posts described in Clause 63 of the "General Directions," the following rules shall apply:—

**(a) On Portions not exceeding 2,560 acres in area.**

Four of the principal corners, as detailed in Clause 71—provided that such principal corners are not, as a general rule, more than about sixty chains apart, in which case sufficient may be erected to fulfil this condition.

**(b) On Portions exceeding 2,560 acres in area.**

All the corners should be so marked—provided that principal corners are not, as a general rule, nearer than about sixty chains apart. That is, where the boundary consists of a number of short lines, principal posts (Clause 63) are to be placed at about sixty chains apart, the other corners being marked by the split hardwood pegs described in Clause 71.

**(c) On roads intersecting portions.**

Principal posts (Clause 63) should be placed at distances not nearer than about sixty chains apart, other corners being marked with split pegs (Clause 71).
