TRANSFER NOTICE - ST GEORGE CHANNEL SCHEME

Transfer of the businesses, assets and liabilities of SunWater in relation the St George Channel Scheme to Mallowa Irrigation Limited

1. Transfer and Transfer Day

I, Anthony Lynham, Minister for Natural Resources, Mines and Energy:

- (a) pursuant to section 722 of the Water Act, declare that the Transfer Day for the Declared Channel Scheme is immediately prior to 1 July 2018; and
- (b) do each of the things (set out in clause 2) with effect on and from the Transfer Day:

2. Things done under section 723(1)

2.1 Transfer of business, asset or liability of SunWater to Irrigation Entity (section 723(1)(a))

- (a) Provide that:
 - (i) the assets set out in Table 1 of the Transfer Schedule; and
 - (ii) the liabilities set out in Table 2 of the Transfer Schedule.are transferred from SunWater to the Irrigation Entity.
- (b) For the avoidance of doubt:
 - (i) any unknown or contingent liabilities that arose or are in connection with any fact, event or circumstance which occurred or existed prior to the Transfer Day; or
 - (ii) any liabilities other than Scheduled Liabilities the subject of a claim, demand or cause of action however arising, in relation to any fact, event or circumstance which occurred or existed prior to the Transfer Day,

are not transferred to the Irrigation Entity, but the Irrigation Entity will be responsible for any liabilities to the extent that the liabilities are caused or contributed to by the Irrigation Entity, on or after the Transfer Day.

2.2 Grant of lease, easement or other interest in land (section 723(1)(c))

Grant to:

- (a) SunWater, the leases, easements and other interests in land set out in Table 3 of the Transfer Schedule;
- (b) the Irrigation Entity, the leases, easements and other interests in land set out in Table 4 of the Transfer Schedule.

2.3 Vary or extinguish a lease, easement or other interest in land (section 723(1)(d))

- (a) Vary the leases, easements and other interests in land held by SunWater set out in Table 5 of the Transfer Schedule in the way set out for the relevant lease, easement or other interest in the "Variation" column in Table 5.
- (b) Extinguish the leases, easements and other interests in land held by SunWater set out in Table 6 of the Transfer Schedule.

2.4 Transfer an easement (section 723(1)(e))

Provide that the easements set out in Table 7 of the Transfer Schedule transfer from SunWater to the Irrigation Entity and:

- (a) otherwise than as specified in the Transfer Notice and where the context permits, all references in the listed easement to SunWater are to be taken as references to the Irrigation Entity;
- (b) any amount that becomes payable to or by SunWater or the Irrigation Entity under the easement for the period:
 - (i) prior to the Transfer Day, is payable to or by SunWater; and
 - (ii) on and from the Transfer Day is payable to or by the Irrigation Entity;
- (c) all rights or entitlements under the easement:
 - (i) prior to the Transfer Day, are held by SunWater; and
 - (ii) on and from the Transfer Day are held by the Irrigation Entity.

2.5 Leases held under the Land Act 1994 (section 723(1)(f))

In relation to:

- (a) the leases listed in Table 8 of the Transfer Schedule, transfer each lease from the entity specified in the "Transferor" column to the entity specified in the "Transferee" column for that lease in Table 8, and
 - (i) otherwise than as specified in the Transfer Notice and where the context permits, all references in the listed lease to SunWater are to be taken as references to the Irrigation Entity;
 - (ii) any amount that becomes payable to or by SunWater or the Irrigation Entity under the lease for the period:
 - A. prior to the Transfer Day, is payable to or by SunWater; and
 - B. on and from the Transfer Day is payable to or by the Irrigation Entity;

- (iii) all rights or entitlements under the lease:
 - A. prior to the Transfer Day, are held by SunWater; and
 - B. on and from the Transfer Day are held by the Irrigation Entity; and
- (b) the leases listed in Table 9 of the Transfer Schedule, change the purpose of each lease to the purpose specified in the "New Purpose" column for that lease in Table 9;
- (c) the leases listed in Table 10 of the Transfer Schedule, change the condition or conditions imposed on the lease in the way specified in the "Changed Conditions" column for that lease in Table 10;
- (d) the leases listed in Table 11 of the Transfer Schedule, grant a sublease of the lease:
 - (i) to the entity specified in the "Sublessee" column of Table 11;
 - (ii) on the terms referred to in the "Sublease Terms" column of Table 11;for each lease.

2.6 Reserve under Land Act 1994 (section 723(1)(g))

In relation to:

- (a) the reserves listed in Table 12 of the Transfer Schedule, change the purpose for which each reserve is dedicated to the purpose specified in the "New Purpose" column for that reserve in Table 12;
- (b) the reserves listed in Table 13 of the Transfer Schedule, remove the existing trustee of the reserve and appoint the person listed in the "New Trustee" column of Table 13 as the new trustee, subject to the conditions (if any) specified in the "Conditions" column in Table 13.

2.7 Legal Proceedings (section 723(1)(i))

Provide that the legal proceedings that are currently being, or may be taken by or against SunWater specified in Table 14 of the Transfer Schedule are to be continued or taken by or against the Irrigation Entity.

2.8 Instruments (section 723(1)(j))

Provide that:

- (a) the instruments listed in Table 15 of the Transfer Schedule be issued to the Irrigation Entity;
- (b) the instruments listed in Table 16 of the Transfer Schedule be transferred to the Irrigation Entity and:
 - (i) the Irrigation Entity is deemed to hold or is a party to the instrument;
 - (ii) the instrument or a benefit or right provided by an instrument is taken to be granted to or in favour of the Irrigation Entity;
 - (iii) otherwise than as specified in the Transfer Notice and where the context permits, all references in the listed instrument to SunWater are to be taken as references to the Irrigation Entity;

- (iv) any amount that becomes payable to or by SunWater or the Irrigation Entity under the instrument for the period:
 - A. prior to the Transfer Day, is payable to or by SunWater; and
 - B. on and from the Transfer Day is payable to or by the Irrigation Entity;
- (v) all rights or entitlements under the instrument:
 - A. prior to the Transfer Day, are held by SunWater; and
 - B. on and from the Transfer Day are held by the Irrigation Entity; and
- (vi) the instruments are amended in the way set out in the "Amendment" column for the relevant instrument in Table 16;
- (c) the instruments of SunWater listed in Table 17 of the Transfer Schedule are amended in the way set out in the "Amendment" column for the relevant instrument in Table 17.
- (d) the instruments listed in Table 18 of the Transfer Schedule be applied to the entity specified in, and in the way specified in, the "Application" column for that instrument in Table 18.

2.9 Supplemental Matters (section 723(1)(n))

- (a) For this transfer notice, SunWater must treat—
 - (i) the transfer of a Scheduled Asset to the Irrigation Entity as a distribution to owner that is to be considered as a redemption of contributed equity;
 - (ii) the transfer of a Scheduled Liability to the Irrigation Entity as a contribution by owner that is to be considered as an increase in contributed equity; and
 - (iii) the value of a Scheduled Asset or Scheduled Liability as being the value of the asset recorded in the accounts of SunWater immediately before the Transfer Day.
- (b) For this transfer notice, the Irrigation Entity must treat:
 - (i) the transfer of a Scheduled Asset from SunWater as a contribution by owner that is to be considered as an increase in contributed equity;
 - (ii) the transfer of a Scheduled Liability from SunWater as a contribution by owner that is to be considered as a redemption of contributed equity; and
 - (iii) the value of a Scheduled Asset or Scheduled Liability as being the value of the asset recorded in the accounts of SunWater immediately before the Transfer day.

2.10 Other documents (section 723(3))

The Minister is satisfied that it would be inappropriate for the Transfer Schedules to be stated in this Transfer Notice because of the size and content of the schedules.

3. Interpretation

3.1 Definitions

In this Transfer Notice and in the Transfer Schedules:

Declared Channel Scheme means the St George channel scheme.

Employees means the transferable employees for the Declared Channel Scheme, as that term is defined in section 738 of the Water Act.

Irrigation Entity means Mallowa Irrigation Limited ACN 616 181 741.

Minister means the Minister for Natural Resources, Mines and Energy.

Public Records has the meaning given in the Public Records Act.

Public Records Act means the Public Records Act 2002 (Qld).

Records means all records in the custody or control of SunWater relating to, or otherwise in connection with, the Declared Channel Scheme, including the Employees.

Scheduled Asset means an asset transferred in accordance with clause 2.1(a)(i) of this Transfer Notice.

Scheduled Liability means a liability transferred in accordance with clause 2.1(a)(ii) of this Transfer Notice.

State means the State of Queensland as represented by the Department of Energy and Water Supply.

SunWater means SunWater Limited ACN 131 034 985.

Transfer Day means the day declared under clause 1(a) of this Transfer Notice.

Transfer Notice means this transfer notice made by the Minister under section 723(1) of the Water Act.

Transfer Schedules means a schedule signed by the Minister and kept available in accordance with section 723(3) at the Department of Natural Resources, Mines and Energy at 1 William Street, Brisbane in the State of Queensland, showing the assets and liabilities of SunWater, and the instruments applying to SunWater, to be transferred, issued or applied to the Irrigation Entity and any annexures and attachments to those schedules.

Water Act means the Water Act 2000 (Qld).

3.2 Water Act

Unless the context requires otherwise, words and expression used in this Transfer Notice and in the Transfer Schedules which are not otherwise defined in clause 3.1 have the meaning that those words or expressions have in chapter 4A of the Water Act.

3.3 Headings

Headings do not affect the interpretation of this Transfer Notice or the Transfer Schedules.

NOTIFICATION OF DANGER TO MARINE SAFETY

Maritime Safety Queensland
Gladstone, 26 June 2018

I, John Fallon, Regional Harbour Master, Maritime Safety Queensland, pursuant to section 197(2) of the *Transport Operations (Marine Safety) Regulation 2016*, declare that a person must not anchor, berth, moor or operate a ship (other than a ship operated by those organisations listed in **Schedule C**) in the waters described in **Schedule A** and **Schedule B** for the period 0400 on 28 June 2018 until 1800 on 2 July 2018 inclusive.

All waters within a 100 metre radius of the ex-Navy vessel "HMAS Tobruk" and associated tugs while on its assisted transit of the Burnett River from the Port of Bundaberg, until it is 500 metres clear of the marked channel, as described on map C3-115 prepared by Maritime Safety Queensland and held at the Maritime Safety Queensland office in Bundaberg.

The terms of the rebate will apply from 1 July 2018 regardless of the date on which this notice is published.

QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT ELECTRICITY REBATE

1. A Queensland Government Electricity Rebate is available to a customer provided the customer:
 - (a) holds one of the following:
 - (i) a current Pensioner Concession Card; or
 - (ii) a current Health Care Card; or
 - (iii) Repatriation Health Card for All Conditions (Gold Card) and is in receipt of one of the following payments:
 - (A) War Widow (including Widowed Mother [AMS] Pension); or
 - (B) Special Rate T.P.I. (including Blinded Disability) Pension; or
 - (iv) Queensland Seniors Card; or
 - (v) Asylum seeker status (ImmiCard) with a Bridging Visa Subclass 050, 051 or 070; and
 - (b) Is a customer of a retail entity at the premises for which the rebate is claimed and the premises is the customer's principal place of residence, and the only residence in Queensland for which the customer claims the rebate; and
 - (c) lives alone or shares the premises in respect of which the rebate is claimed with:
 - (i) the customer's spouse; or
 - (ii) other persons who hold a current and valid card of the type described in paragraph (a) above; or
 - (iii) other persons wholly dependent on the customer; or
 - (iv) other persons who receive an income support payment from Centrelink, Department of Human Services or Department of Veterans' Affairs and who do not pay rent; or
 - (v) other persons who live with the customer to provide care and assistance and who do not pay rent; and

- (d) declares that no other person(s) except casual visitors share the residence with the customer; and
 - (e) makes application for a rebate either by submitting the relevant form or, at the discretion of the retail entity, by providing the relevant information and declarations by telephone or electronic means.
2. Where an electricity account is in more than one name, and more than one resident is eligible to receive the rebate, each resident may have their eligibility established. However, only one rebate per household will be paid.
 3. The retail entity may, at any time, require a new application from a customer and if the customer fails to lodge a new application within the time specified by the retail entity the rebate shall cease.
 4. A Queensland Government Electricity Rebate is also applicable to the electricity account of residential home parks and other similar multi-tenanted residential premises provided the following sub-conditions are met:
 - (a) the customer (i.e. the owner or operator of the multi-tenanted residential premises) of the retail entity at the premises concerned –
 - (i) supplies electricity to the separately identifiable vans, flats or home units, or other similar living units at the premises; and
 - (ii) charges for electricity on the basis of metered consumption; and
 - (iii) is claiming the rebate on behalf of eligible persons (other than the person being a customer of the retail entity) residing at the premises ('claimant residents'); and
 - (iv) passes on the rebate in full to each claimant resident by way of a reduction in charges for electricity; and
 - (v) has obtained each claimant resident's authority to:
 - (A) apply for the rebate; and
 - (B) verify the claimant resident's details with the Australian Government Department of Human Services or the Department of Veterans' Affairs or the Department of Immigration and Border Protection or the Queensland Government Department of Communities, Disability Services and Seniors; and
 - (C) disclose their details in connection with eligibility and receiving the rebate; and
 - (vi) has sighted the claimant resident's Pensioner Concession Card, Health Care Card, Repatriation Health Card for all Conditions (Gold Card), Queensland Seniors Card or ImmiCard at the time the application for the rebate is made, to ensure it is issued in the name of the claimant resident; and
 - (b) each separately identifiable living unit for which the rebate is claimed is occupied, from the day the claimant resident has applied to the customer, by persons who, if they had been supplied directly by the retail entity, would have been eligible for the electricity rebate; and

- (c) a rebate is applicable to claimant residents for electricity consumed in the billing period to which the customer's electricity account relates, from the day the claimant resident has applied to the customer; and
 - (d) a completed rebate application form, in writing, must be produced with the customer's electricity account at the time payment is tendered.
5. The rebate is \$ 0.8489 (GST exclusive) per day, applied against the amount billed under the applicable (GST exclusive) tariff for the retail services provided to the customer in the billing period to which the rebate relates. The retail entity must apply the rebate to provide the maximum benefit to the customer.
 6. The amount of the rebate paid shall not be greater than the amount billed (GST exclusive) for customer retail services provided to the customer in the billing period to which the rebate relates.
 7. For rebate recipients supplied with card-operated meters, given these customers do not receive an electricity bill, the retail entity will agree with the Department of Communities, Disability Services and Seniors for a delivery process providing, over the financial year, a rebate on electricity costs comparable with the rebate received by customers on other metering arrangements.

RELIEF FROM ELECTRICITY CHARGES WHERE DROUGHT DECLARATION IN FORCE

Relief assistance also available for Queensland farmers in drought declared areas through waivers or reimbursements of fixed charge components of relevant electricity accounts.

Customers of Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd

A Standard Contract Customer of Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd who is a farmer in a drought declared area or whose property is individually drought declared under Queensland Government administrative processes may be eligible for one or more of the following forms of relief from electricity charges:

(A) Waiving of fixed charge components of electricity charges

If a customer of Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd who is a farmer in a drought declared area or whose property is individually drought declared, does not have access to, or has severely restricted access to, farm or irrigation water, the fixed components of the customer's electricity charges shall be waived. These fixed charge components include fixed charge (annual), daily supply charge and metering charges but exclude minimum demand charges as set out in the Retail Electricity Prices for Standard Contract Customers Tariff Schedule.

Provided the drought declaration remains operative, the waiver applies to all eligible fixed charges applicable to any account being used for pumping water for farm or irrigation purposes. The waiver shall continue to apply until the drought declaration is revoked.

(B) Deferral of payment

If a customer of Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd who is a farmer in a drought declared area or whose property is individually drought declared cites financial difficulties as a result of the drought, the customer is entitled to defer payment of the customer's electricity accounts relating to farm usage.

Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd may charge interest on deferred accounts. However, the rate of any interest charged must not be more than the Bank Bill reference rate for 90 days, as published on the first business day of each quarter.

Subject to the maximum rate of interest that may be charged, the terms of the deferred payment and the repayment of deferred amounts following revocation of the drought declaration will be as agreed between Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd and the customer concerned.

Eligibility for Relief

A customer of Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd seeking relief from electricity charges on the basis that the customer is a farmer who is in a drought declared area or whose property is individually drought declared, must apply in writing to Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd.

If required by Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd, the customer must provide:

- a) evidence that the customer's property is in a drought declared area or is individually drought declared, including the effective date of such drought declaration;
- b) evidence of the water pumping restrictions applicable to the customer's property; and
- c) for tariffs other than Tariffs 62, 65 and 66, a Statutory Declaration stating the specific account(s), and that the connection is being used primarily for pumping water for farm or irrigation purposes; and/or
- d) a Statutory Declaration stating that the customer is experiencing financial difficulties as a result of the drought, the specific account(s) and that the connection is being used primarily for farm purposes.

Customers of other retailers

Customers of retailers other than Ergon Energy Queensland Pty Ltd who are farmers in drought declared areas or who have a property which is individually drought declared under Queensland Government administrative processes can apply directly to the Department of Natural Resources, Mines and Energy for reimbursement of the fixed charge components of the customer's electricity charges.

These fixed charge components include fixed charge (annual), daily supply charge and metering charges, but exclude minimum demand charges.

Provided the drought declaration remains operative, the reimbursement applies to all eligible fixed charges applicable to any account being used for pumping water for farm or irrigation purposes and ceases once the drought declaration is revoked.

*Gas Supply Act 2003***QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT RETICULATED NATURAL GAS REBATE**

I hereby advise that, on and from 1 July 2018, the Queensland Government Reticulated Natural Gas Rebate, which is to be provided by retailers under section 175A of the *Gas Supply Act 2003*, will be provided on the terms set out in the following schedule. The terms of the rebate will apply from 1 July 2018 regardless of the date on which this notice is published.

QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT RETICULATED NATURAL GAS REBATE

1. A Queensland Government Reticulated Natural Gas Rebate is available to a customer provided the customer:
 - (a) holds a current and valid card of the following type –
 - (i) Pensioner Concession Card, issued by either Centrelink or the Department of Veterans' Affairs; or
 - (ii) Repatriation Health Card for All Conditions (Gold Card) and is in receipt of one of the following payments:
 - (A) War Widow (including Widowed Mother [AMS] Pension); or
 - (B) Special Rate T.P.I. (including Blinded Disability) Pension; or
 - (iii) Queensland Seniors Card; and
 - (b) is a customer of a retailer at the premises for which the rebate is claimed and the premises is the customer's principal place of residence, and the only residence in Queensland for which the customer claims the rebate; and
 - (c) lives alone or shares the premises in respect of which the rebate is claimed with:
 - (i) the customer's spouse; or
 - (ii) other persons who hold a current and valid card of the type described in paragraph (a) above; or
 - (iii) other persons wholly dependent on the customer; or
 - (iv) other persons who receive an income support payment from Centrelink, Department of Human Services or Department of Veterans' Affairs and who do not pay rent; or
 - (v) other persons who live with the customer to provide care and assistance and who do not pay rent; anddeclares that no other person(s) except casual visitors share the residence with the customer; and
 - (d) makes application for a rebate either by submitting the relevant form or, at the discretion of the retailer, by providing the relevant information and declarations by telephone or electronic means.

2. Where a gas account is in more than one name, and more than one resident is eligible to receive the rebate, each resident may have their eligibility established. However, only one rebate per household will be paid.
3. The retailer may, at any time, require a new application from a customer and if the customer fails to lodge a new application within the time specified by the retailer the rebate shall cease.
4. A Queensland Government Reticulated Natural Gas Rebate is also applicable to the gas account of residential home parks and other similar multi-tenanted residential premises provided the following sub-conditions are met:
 - (a) the customer (i.e. the owner or operator of the multi-tenanted residential premises) of the retailer at the premises concerned –
 - (i) supplies gas to each of the separately identifiable vans, flats or home units, or other similar living units at the premises; and
 - (ii) charges for gas on the basis of metered consumption; and
 - (iii) is claiming the rebate on behalf of eligible persons (other than the person being a customer of the retailer) residing at the premises ('claimant residents'); and
 - (iv) will fully pass on the rebate to each claimant resident by way of a reduction in charges for gas; and
 - (v) has obtained each claimant resident's authority to:
 - (A) apply for the rebate; and
 - (B) verify the claimant resident's details with the Australian Government Department of Human Services or the Department of Veterans' Affairs or the Queensland Government Department of Communities, Disability Services and Seniors; and
 - (C) disclose their details in connection with eligibility and receiving the rebate; and
 - (vi) has sighted the claimant resident's Pensioner Concession Card, Repatriation Health Card for all Conditions (Gold Card) or Queensland Seniors Card (as applicable) at the time the application for the rebate is made, to ensure it is issued in the name of the claimant resident; and
 - (b) each separately identifiable living unit for which the rebate is claimed is occupied, from the day the claimant resident has applied to the customer, by persons who, if they had been supplied directly by the retailer, would have been eligible for the Reticulated Natural Gas Rebate; and
 - (c) a rebate is applicable to claimant residents for gas consumed in the billing period to which the customer's gas account relates, from the day the claimant resident has applied to the customer; and
 - (d) a completed rebate application form, in writing, must be produced with the customer's gas account at the time payment is tendered.
5. The rebate is **\$0.1806** (GST exclusive) per day applied against the dollar and cents value of the gas consumed based on the applicable (GST exclusive) tariff.

The rebate paid shall not be greater than the amount billed (excluding GST) for customer retail services provided to the customer in the billing period to which the rebate relates.

PART 1 – PRELIMINARY

Pursuant to section 17 of the *Public Trustee Act 1978* (the “Act”) the Public Trustee by this gazette notice fixes the fees and charges for the services the public trustee performs or provides.

1. Short title

This notice may be cited as the *Public Trustee (Fees and Charges Notice) (No.1) 2018*

2. Commencement

This notice commences on 1 July 2018 (the “date of commencement”).

3. Definitions

The dictionary in schedule 15 defines particular words used in this notice.

4. Fees

The undermentioned fees, inclusive of GST, shall be payable to the public trustee in respect of the matters mentioned.

5. Remission of fees

The fees in this gazette notice apply to the types of services specified herein. However pursuant to section 8 of the *Public Trustee Regulation 2012* the public trustee may remit any or all of the fees in any particular estate or matter otherwise payable. The public trustee’s approved community service obligations address the ability of clients of limited means to pay fees for the level of service required by them, by exercising the authority in section 8 of the *Public Trustee Regulation 2012* to remit the fees payable by those clients to an appropriate level.

PART 2 – DECEASED ESTATES

6. Application of part 2

This part applies to deceased estates and matters accepted for administration on or after the date of commencement.

7. Acting as personal representative or administrator

- (1) Subject to subsections (3) and (4), the fee payable for acting as personal representative or administrator under part 3 of the Act are calculated by applying the total number of "standard units of effort" required to administer the estate in schedule 2 part A to determine the appropriate service level as specified in schedule 1;
- (2) The general administration activities and duties for acting under this section are stated in schedule 3;
- (3) The minimum fee for an estate requiring full administration is \$1654.45

-
- (4) Where the only asset is land solely in the name of the deceased and the only action necessary is a transmission application by death with the original will, the fee payable is \$985.75

8. Acting as agent for an executor

- (1) Subject to subsection (2) the fee payable for acting as agent for an executor to administer the estate of a deceased person is calculated by applying the total number of “standard units of effort” required to administer the estate in schedule 2 part A to determine the appropriate service level as specified in schedule 1.
- (2) Where the only action necessary is a transmission application in respect to the deceased’s real property, the fee payable is \$985.75

9. Land dealing – held as joint tenants

The fee payable for acting on the instructions of a surviving joint tenant to record the death of a joint owner of real property is \$607.05

10. Additional Service fees

The public trustee may charge additional service fees for the activities specified in part 13 in addition to the fees fixed in this part.

11. Deceased beneficiary

The fee payable for distributing the funds held for a deceased beneficiary shall be:

- (a) Where the funds held are distributed following the production of probate or a grant of administration - \$329.25
- (b) In all other cases, calculated at the hourly rate, with a minimum fee of \$329.25 and a maximum fee of \$1098.80

PART 3 – DISABILITY SERVICES

12. Application of part 3

Part 3 applies where the public trustee is:

- (a) Appointed as administrator for a financial matter, under the *Guardianship and Administration Act 2000* (the “GAAT Act”); or
- (b) Appointed as manager of the estates of an incapacitated person under part 6 of the Act or acts pursuant to section 79 of the Act.

13. Fees payable under section 12

The annual fees payable under section 12 are:

- (1) (a) Where the public trustee is appointed under chapter 11 part 3 of the GAAT Act as administrator for a financial matter limited to a court sanction of a settlement in favour of an adult:
- (i) An initial establishment fee of \$6262.90; and

-
- (ii) A personal financial administration fee calculated by applying schedule 5; or
 - (b) For any other appointment as administrator under the GAAT Act, a personal financial administration fee calculated by applying schedule 4; or
 - (c) For acting as manager under part 6 of the Act, a personal financial administration fee calculated by applying schedule 4; and
- (2) An asset management fee calculated by applying schedule 6; and
 - (3) For each real estate property or other place of residence the fee is prescribed by schedule 6.

14. Remission of fee for principal place of residence

Where a real estate property is occupied by the client as their principal place of residence the fee prescribed in section 13 (3) shall be remitted.

15. Additional Service fees

The public trustee may charge additional service fees for the activities specified in part 13 in addition to the fees fixed in this part.

PART 4 – AGENCIES

16. Application of part 4

Part 4 applies where the public trustee acts as an attorney under the *Powers of Attorney Act 1998* (the “POA Act”).

- (a) For financial matters;
- (b) Under section 147 of the Act;
- (c) During period of suspension of an enduring power of attorney under section 35 of the *Public Guardian Act 2014*;
- (d) For personal and health matters.

17. Fee payable under this part

Subject to section 18 the fee payable shall be:

- (a) For sections 16(a) or (b) appointments, the fees as prescribed by part 3 sections 13 (1)(b), (2) and (3);
- (b) For sections 16(c) or (d) appointments, the fee is calculated at the hourly rate.

18. The public trustee and a capable principal may negotiate fees

The public trustee and a capable principal may agree (in writing) on the fees payable for acting for the principal provided that if no agreement is reached the fees will be calculated at the hourly rate.

19. Additional Service fees

The public trustee may charge additional service fees for the activities specified in part 13 in addition to the fees fixed in this part.

PART 5 – TRUSTS**20. Application of part 5**

Part 5 applies where the public trustee is appointed or otherwise becomes trustee of property.

21. Fees payable in trusts other than testamentary trusts

Except where the trust instrument provides otherwise, the annual fees payable for acting as trustee of trusts, other than testamentary trusts and DGR charitable trusts, are:

- (a) A service level fee calculated by applying schedule 7;
- (b) An asset management fee calculated by applying schedule 6; and
- (c) For each real estate property the fee is prescribed by schedule 6.

22. Remission of fee for principal place of residence

Where a real estate property held in trust is occupied by the beneficiary as their principal place of residence the fee prescribed in section 21 (c) shall be remitted.

23. Fees payable for testamentary trusts

The fees payable for acting as trustee of a testamentary trust:

- (1) The annual fees payable for the duration of a life or limited interest are:
 - (a) A service level fee calculated by applying schedule 8;
 - (b) An asset management fee calculated by applying schedule 6; and
 - (c) For each real estate property the fee is prescribed by schedule 6.
- (2) The fees payable on the cessation of the life or limited interest are calculated by applying the total number of "standard units of effort" required to complete the administration of the estate in schedule 2 part B to determine the appropriate service level as specified in schedule 1;
- (3) Where there is no life or limited interest forming part of the trust the annual fees payable for the duration of the trust are:
 - (a) A service level fee calculated by applying schedule 7;
 - (b) An asset management fee calculated by applying schedule 6; and
 - (c) For each real estate property the fee is prescribed by schedule 6.

24. Remission of fee in testamentary trusts for principal place of residence

Where a real estate property is occupied by:

- (a) a person who is entitled to a life or limited interest under the trust, or

- (b) the beneficiary under the trust as their principal place of residence

the fee prescribed in section 23(1) (c) or 23(3) (c) shall be remitted.

25. Additional Service fees

The public trustee may charge additional service fees for the activities specified in part 13 in addition to the fees fixed in this part.

26. DGR Charitable Trusts

The annual fees and charges payable for acting as trustee of a DGR charitable trust (except for those trusts where the fees and charges were set pursuant to the former s.10(3) of the *Public Trustee Regulations 1989*) shall be as prescribed by the trust instrument, or in the absence of a provision to prescribe fees and charges, a fee of 6% (excluding GST) of the income received for the trust.

PART 6 – PRISONERS

27. Application of part 6

Part 6 applies where the public trustee is managing the property of prisoners under part 7 of the Act.

28. Fee payable under this part

The fee payable under this part shall be calculated at the hourly rate.

PART 7 - TAXATION SERVICES

29. Application of part 7

Part 7 applies to the taxation services provided by the public trustee.

30. Fees payable

Fees calculated at the hourly rate shall apply for the following taxation services:

- (a) Preparation and lodgement of personal and trust income tax returns and other tax documents, including checking of assessments;
- (b) Preparation of partnership and business accounts together with the preparation and lodgement of the relevant taxation returns;
- (c) Conducting research and providing taxation advice;
- (d) Preparation and lodgement of regular Business Activity Statements subject to a minimum annual fee of \$189.10;
- (e) The reconstruction of asset registers required for Capital Gains Tax purposes where such registers were not properly maintained by the deceased or client prior to the public trustee's administration;
- (f) Setting up and maintaining Capital Gains Tax registers during the public trustee's administration or management.

PART 8 - PROPERTY SERVICES

31. Application of part 8

Part 8 applies to the property management, valuation, auctioneering and related services provided by the public trustee.

32. Property management fee

The fees payable for acting as property manager are calculated by applying schedule 9.

33. Valuation fee

The fee payable for carrying out valuation services is calculated by applying schedule 10.

34. Auctioneers and agents commission

The commission payable for acting as auctioneer or selling agent is calculated by applying schedule 11.

35. Agreed fee or conjunction fee

The public trustee may negotiate a fee with the principal or accept a lower fee when acting in conjunction with another agent.

PART 9 – INVESTMENT SERVICES

36. Application of part 9

Part 9 applies to the investment services provided by the public trustee.

37. Negotiation of investments

The fee payable for negotiating and arranging investment of funds, other than in the Public Trustee Investment Funds is stated in schedule 12 and shall apply for the term of such investment.

38. Managing the Public Trustee Investment Funds

- (1) The fee for acting as trustee of the Public Trustee Investment Fund shall be at a rate not exceeding 1.61% (including GST) per annum of the market value of the funds.
- (2) The management fee payable shall be calculated daily by the public trustee and paid monthly in arrears.

39. Custodial trustee

The fee payable for acting as custodial trustee under the *Corporations Act 2001* (Cwth) or the *Superannuation Industry (Supervision) Act 1993* (Cwth) shall be agreed between the parties.

40. Corporate trustee services

The fee payable for providing corporate trustee services in commercial business trusts shall be agreed between the parties.

**PART 10 – SPECIAL FUNCTIONS OF
A PUBLIC NATURE****41. Application of part 10**

Part 10 applies to the functions of the public trustee outlined in part 5 of the Act.

42. Sanction under Section 59

The fee for a sanction by the public trustee under section 59 of the Act of a compromise of actions by or on behalf of persons under a legal disability claiming money or damages or a settlement or a compromise or the acceptance of money paid into court is calculated by applying schedule 14.

43. Section 61 and 62

- (1) Subject to subsection (2), the fee payable for exercising powers under sections 61 and 62 of the Act shall be calculated at the hourly rate.
- (2) Where the public trustee acts under sections 61 or 62 of the Act prior to the acceptance for administration of an estate the minimum fee is \$393.15 in all other cases, the minimum fee is \$523.55.

44. Audit of trusts

The fee payable for the audit of a trust under section 60 of the Act shall be calculated at the hourly rate.

**PART 11 - UNCLAIMED MONEYS AND
UNCLAIMED PROPERTY****45. Application of part 11**

Part 11 applies to the functions of the public trustee as outlined in part 8 of the Act.

46. Unclaimed property

The fee payable to administer unclaimed property pursuant to part 8 division 2 of the Act shall be calculated at the hourly rate.

47. Unclaimed moneys and unclaimed superannuation

The fee payable for receipt of unclaimed moneys pursuant to part 8 division 1 of the Act and moneys held unclaimed on behalf of estates and trusts and transferred to the unclaimed moneys fund pursuant to section 116 of the Act shall be \$253.10.

48. Inspecting the register

The fee for inspecting the unclaimed moneys register shall be:

- (a) Fee for inspecting the register
\$36.75 per name searched
- (b) Paper copy of details from the register
\$2.30 per page up to 20 pages
In excess of 20 pages at the hourly rate for the time taken to prepare the paper copy
- (c) Providing an electronic copy of register
Charged at the hourly rate for the time taken to prepare and dispatch the electronic copy.

49. Managing the unclaimed moneys fund

The fee for managing the unclaimed moneys fund shall be at the rate of 6.6% per annum on the first \$50,000 of income received and then at the rate of 5.5% per annum on the excess income over \$50,000.

PART 12 – MISCELLANEOUS SERVICES**50. Powers of attorney**

- (1) Subject to subsection (2), the fees payable for the preparation or revocation of an enduring power of attorney or general power of attorney are stated in schedule 13.
- (2) Where the public trustee is appointed as the primary attorney under a power of attorney, no fee shall be payable for the preparation of the document.

51. Right of the Crown to bona vacantia

The fee payable for the preparation and making of an application for the waiver of the rights of the Crown to bona vacantia shall be calculated at the hourly rate with a minimum fee of \$419.00.

52. Reseal of grant of administration

The fee payable for resealing a grant of administration made outside Queensland or obtaining a grant in Queensland on behalf of an executor or administrator resident outside Queensland where the public trustee does not administer the Queensland estate shall be calculated at the hourly rate.

53. Application under Workers' Compensation and Rehabilitation Act 2003

The fee payable for making, investigating or prosecuting an application for compensation under section 111 of the *Workers' Compensation and Rehabilitation Act 2003* or for conducting any appeal or reference under the provisions of that Act shall be calculated at the hourly rate.

54. Disaster appeals fund

- (1) Subject to subsection (2), the fee payable for administering and managing the disaster appeals fund shall be 2.47% of interest received on such moneys held on behalf of the disaster appeals fund in the common fund and 1.1% of other income received.
- (2) No fee shall be charged in respect of moneys paid to or representing the proceeds of property transferred to or vested in the public trustee under the provisions of sections 35B, 35C, or 35D of the *Collections Act 1966*.

PART 13 – ADDITIONAL SERVICE FEES**55. Application of hourly charge**

- (1) Additional Service fees calculated at the hourly rate shall be payable, when acting in any capacity or carrying out or undertaking any of the activities set out in this part:
 - (a) Arranging and authorising a funeral or cremation for a deceased person where there is no other person able or willing to do so.
 - (b) Providing instructions or other information to the Official Solicitor to the Public Trustee in regard to legal services provided by the Official Solicitor.
 - (c) Undertaking genealogical research to establish entitlements to a deceased person's estate.
 - (d) Dealing with or disposing of household furniture, effects, chattels and jewellery where there is no agreement in writing from the beneficiaries or other persons having a claim.
 - (e) Taking necessary action to deal with or preserve a client's interest in a trust, corporation, business or partnership.
 - (f) The collection or payment of considerable debts owing to or by a client at the time of commencement of the public trustee's management or administration.
 - (g) Any other activity undertaken by the public trustee for which no fee has been set in this notice.
- (2) The activities set out in this section are in addition to and not included in the activities set out in schedules 2 and 3.

56. Death of Incapacitated person under part 6 of the Act

The fee payable for the disposal of property on death under section 88 of the Act shall be:

- (a) Where the property held is disposed of following the production of probate or a grant of administration - \$329.25;
