


The justice system might mean

• make our justice system fairer






• make our services better for everyone

We will do this by making a **Better Justice plan**.




We call it the **plan**.

We think this shows the justice system could do better.




People can be more likely to go to prison if

 they have trauma that has been in their family for a long time



• they have a socio economic disadvantage.



having less money



- living somewhere that has less access to jobs or education
 - for example, a rural community.





We want to keep as many First Nations peoples out of prison as we can.

How we made the plan



To get information to make the plan we talked and listened to

community organisations and other groups
who work with First Nations peoples



government agencies



 First Nations peoples who have been through the justice system.




They told us what has been working well and what has not been working well.





They also told us

- First Nations peoples should be involved in decisions about change
 - for example, get given information and share ideas



• there should be real change, not just talking




 the public should know how the justice system impacts First Nations peoples.

• the number of First Nations peoples in prison.




The report said

What is in the plan




To make sure there are less First Nations peoples in prison

 the whole of the Queensland Government must do things differently



 First Nations peoples must have a say in decisions about what changes.



We made the plan into 4 parts.



Part 1

The Queensland Government will work with First Nations peoples to make decisions.





We will work with First Nations communities to

- help First Nations peoples early so they are less likely to do crimes
 - for example, we will support families if they need it



 make decisions that help meet the needs of First Nations peoples.







We will make the justice system fairer and safer for First Nations peoples.





To do this we will make sure we know if racism is being done and how to stop it.




Racism means someone is treated differently because of their race.




Part 4.

• if they are in prison




• when they leave prison.






First Nations peoples will help us make the programs to fit with First Nations culture.
