About this index

This index was compiled from the <u>Inwards Correspondence</u>, <u>S5253</u> created by the Colonial Secretary Office from 10 December 1859 to 6 August 1896. This index was compiled by Mark Copland, Andrew Walker and other researchers with the assistance of a grant from Communities and Personal Histories Unit, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Services, Department of Communities.

This historical index does not include traditional names such as K'gari. Names have not been anglicised and appear as in the original record. Further, many words in the descriptive text have been transcribed directly from the original record.

The citations for these in-letters are listed with the year the correspondence was received, followed by the number of the correspondence. For example, 68/1456 is Letter 1456 of 1868.

Tips for searching this index

- Digitised copies of the letters referenced in this index are available by clicking on the ITM links to proceed to *View Digital Copy* to search for the letter numbers.
- To do a keyword search within a PDF file, press the Ctrl and F (or Command and F for Mac computers) buttons on your keyboard and type in your keyword, then press Search.
- Consider all possible spelling variants as many names have been spelt phonetically in the original record. The spelling of names varies considerably.

Letter from 2nd Lieutenant William Swete at Fitzroy dated October 29, 1859 tendering his resignation from the Native Police Force.

Queensland State Archives ITM846730 COL/A1 59/118

Correspondence from Port Curtis (Gladstone) relating to the practice of keeping Aboriginal women in the Native Police camp. Aboriginal persons mentioned: Native Police Trooper Kelly and Daylight, Nelly and Dinah. The letter dated December 10, 1859 also makes a brief reference to massacres at Mr Young's Station. The letter dated August 27, 1859 mentions that the Aboriginal women living at the Native Police



camp "were frequently useful to us in discovering the haunts of some of the most notorious murderers".

Correspondence relating to the appointment of James Davies (aka James Davis; aka Duramboi) as an interpreter for Aboriginals in court.

Correspondence from Native Police officers Carr, Murray and Morisset relating to alleged "outrages" by the Aboriginals near McCartney's station in the Fitzroy River district. Advises on the patrols to catch the offenders and the "dispersing" of the Aboriginals. Aboriginal persons named in the correspondence: Billy Billy, King John, [Bueen?] and Mitzie.

Report from Edric Morisset the Inspector General of Police dated January 18, 1860. Makes recommendations that the Native Police would "be greatly benefited by the appointment of a Drill Sergeant at Rockhampton (Head Quarters) and ... that Officers, Camp Sergeants and troopers, as a rule, are alike ignorant of drill on first being appointed. I would further strongly urge upon the Government the desirability of appointing two additional 2nd Lieutenants one to the 1st and one to the 2nd Divisions, in order that the Lieutenants commanding may be relieved of duty of patrolling the bush after blacks, and be enabled continually to visit and report upon their outstations".

Petition from Daniel Cameron asking for Native Police protection in the Leichhardt district to ensure the safety of his stock. The file also contains a reply from Edric Morisset, the Inspector General of Police, dated January 23, 1860 advising that he cannot guarantee Native Police protection to those who choose to live "far from the present boundary of location ... unless the strength of the Native Police Force is augmented to twice its present number".

Letter from Edric Morisset the Inspector General of Police dated January 23, 1860 recommending John Darley's appointment as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Native Police.

The file contains a letter from William Sims at Bendemere Station dated March 5, 1860 requesting Native Police protection from the Aboriginals camped there. He believes that one of them is named Beilba, one of the Dawson murderers. The file also contains a report from Lieutenant Frederick Carr dated March 8, 1860 in which he advises that he patrolled the Station and found "a mob of upwards of 100 all of the Upper Dawson Tribe". He further advises that the Aboriginals attacked them and in the ensuing battle 15 Aboriginals were killed including "Baulie". The report also mentions the following Native Police Troopers: Paddy, Jack, Tommy, Charlie, May Boy, Tippo, Lewis and Philip.

Letter from Edric Morisset the Inspector General of Police dated April 4, 1860 stating that he disagrees with the Bench regarding the stationing of one Native Trooper at Callandoon (Goondiwindi).

Letter from the NSW Colonial Secretary's Office dated March 31, 1860 advising that in compliance with the request, "instructions have been given for forwarding twelve double barrelled carbines to Brisbane for the use of the Queensland Native Police".

Letter from Edric Morisset, the Inspector General of Police dated June 1, 1860 advising he has a notice to go in the Government Gazette for the call of tenders for blankets and shirts for the Aboriginals. The notice is not in the file.

Report from Edric Morisset, the Commandant of the Native Police, on the state of the Force and suggestions for its improvement dated December 24, 1859. Advises that the Force has five divisions; the Force is not yet at full strength because of the "difficulty recruiting men adapted to the service and because



it is absolutely necessary to recruit in a district as far as possible from that in which the men have to serve and there are now seventeen troopers required to complete the number allowed by the New South Wales Government"; there have been numerous requests for Police protection from stockholders occupying the country north of the Fitzroy but it would be "unsafe to remove any of the detachments from their present stations unless I may except the Division stationed at Wide Bay and Burnett where the blacks are comparatively quiet"; recommends that if "it should be determined to increase the strength of the Force that a recruiting party [should be] sent to the Darling". Attached to the report is an appendix that shows the distribution and present strength of the Native Police Force.

Letter from Edric Morisset, the Inspector General of Police, dated June 4, 1860 forwarding a voucher for the supply of blankets and shirts to the Aboriginals of the Port Curtis district. The attached requisition advises that 75 single blankets and 5 dozen shirts will be needed for distribution to the Aboriginals of the district.

Letter from Lieutenant John O'Connell Bligh of the Native Police at Coopers Plains (Maryborough) dated May 1, 1860 asking for one month's leave of absence.

The newspaper clipping suggests that the owner and Captain of the schooner 'Coquette' with "the assistance of a white man named Edward Priddy, a resident of Maryborough, with some blacks from this town landed upon the Island and succeeded in obtaining possession of two girls whom they took on to Sydney and one of the inducements offered to the blacks to give up possession was a bag full of what was represented to be white money ... large numbers of blacks immediately made their way to this township to make their purchases when they found out the deception ... deep and bitter were the execrations expressed and vows of vengeance were uttered to kill the first white people that ever came amongst them again". (portions of the letter are missing)

Letter from John McConnell relating to an allowance paid to those Native Police troopers who provide horses and equipment at their own expense. (portions of this letter are missing)

Correspondence from the Collector of Customs in Brisbane relating to a report from the Aboriginals of Wide Bay that a boat had been washed ashore 30 miles north of Caloundra. The letter dated July 4 1860 advises that the Aboriginals accompanied Thomas Frazer to the location and for their efforts the "tribe should be conciliated as much as possible ... blankets and some other supplies [should] be given to these natives".

Correspondence from Edric Morisset, the Inspector General of Police recommending that his brother Rudolph and A. Patrick be appointed as 2nd Lieutenants in the 1st division of the Native Police Force.

The letter from John Bramston the Clerk of the Council dated October 9, 1860 advises that the Select Committee has recommended that the Native Police should be expanded "as the new country becomes occupied" and that "Second Lieutenant Powell be promoted to be First Lieutenant in the Native Police - that Charles John Blakeney Esq be appointed Second Lieutenant" and that the necessary supplies be procured for the detachment. The file also contains a report on the Wide Bay and Fitzroy divisions from Edric Morisset the Commandant of the Native Police dated September 17, 1860. He reports that the Aboriginals in these districts have been "tolerably quite and believes that this will continue, "As every case of aggression on their part has been promptly followed by punishment". He also advises that "it will be necessary in a short time to afford protection to those squatters occupying country on the Peak Downs and Albania Downs. I propose forming two detachments of seven or eight troopers each to be stationed in the above localities". Letter 60/1750, 60/1707, 60/1611, Top-numbered to 60/1799.

Letter from Edric Morisset the Commandant of the Native Police. Morisset reports that six of the Native Police troopers of the 1st division under the command of Lieutenant Patrick have deserted. The troopers were recruited by Lieutenant Walker on the Balonne and were then sent with Lieutenant Patrick to the Albania Downs where they met some of their "country men" who incited them to desert.

Report from Edric Morisset the Commandant of the Native Police in relation to an application by Mr Hood for Native Police protection at Teresa Creek, Peak Downs. Morisset reports that it has been difficult to afford protection because they are at present undermanned due to desertions and trips away to procure horses and recruits. When the recruits arrive from the Logan River and Darling River he hopes to be able to afford Mr Hood with protection.

Reports from Edric Morisset the Commandant of the Native Police and Officers Murray and Powell into the alleged murder of a white woman named Fanny Briggs near Raglan Station via Rockhampton. The reports suggest that at first the local Aboriginals were suspected of committing the murder but subsequently suspicion fell on two Native Police troopers from the Fitzroy barracks, but there was insufficient evidence to convict them. Native Police troopers mentioned in the reports include: Toby, Alma,



Gulliver, Billy and Ballantyne. Also mentioned are two local Aboriginal men named Micho and [Keimes?].

Letter from Edric Morisset the Commandant of the Native Police sent from Rockhampton and dated January 7, 1861 requesting clerical assistance because "the duties connected with my office are far greater than anticipated".

Letter from Edric Morisset the Commandant of the Native Police sent from Rockhampton and dated January 15, 1861 acknowledging receipt of a letter from the Colonial Secretary expressing satisfaction "at the steps taken to trace the murder of the late Fanny Briggs to the perpetrators" and directing that monthly reports be sent to the government "as to the state of the Native Police" and that his officers supply quarterly reports on their movements and the "number of deaths that have occurred from collision with the police".

Letter from A. Gregory the Chief Commissioner of Crown Lands dated January 12, 1861 asking for permission to supply Commissioner George Dalrymple with five Aboriginal troopers to help protect him in his work as Crown Lands Commissioner in the Kennedy district.

Correspondence from the Native Police Headquarters in Rockhampton requesting a further two months leave for Lieutenant Darley due to ill health. The letter dated January 19, 1861 also advises that the Commandant, Mr Morisset, met with an accident and has three broken ribs after being kicked by one of the troop horses.

Letter from George Dalrymple, Commissioner for Crown Lands, dated January 24, 1861 advising that he has been delayed in his departure for Port Denison (Bowen) because the "sundry articles of outfit" have not yet arrived, the Commandant (Edric Morisset) has not been able to move the new recruits for the trip from the Maranoa to Rockhampton, and the horses have not yet arrived from Brisbane.

Letter from the Collector of Customs in Brisbane asking for permission to employ some of the Moreton Bay Aboriginals to clear away mangroves at Lytton. Letter from John Blake in Brisbane dated February 2, 1861 applying for a position as a Lieutenant in the Native Police Force.

Letter from Mr McDonald in Brisbane requesting permission to erect a bathing house on the river at Milton. He advises that Aboriginals destroyed the bathing house he previously built on the river.

Page 14 also mentions the making of shelters and hunting implements, Page 15: they throw spears with a woomera, stone axes are used but the boomerang and nulla nulla are unknown to them; the construction of canoes, Page 17: the Gudang tribe (AUSTLANG Language Code Y191) claim the land from Cape York to Fly Point and are small in number having been seriously thinned by their neighbours the Kaurareg / Kororegas from Prince of Wales Island, the Goomkoding (aka Angkamuthi) tribe live on the north west shore, the Yadaijau (aka Yadhaykenu) tribe inhabit the south side of Newcastle Bay and the Kennedy River, the Undooyamo the north side. Page 20 and 21 briefly mention the people of Banks Island, Mulgrave Island, Darnley Island, beche de mer fishing, establishing a Mission.

There is also a telegram to the Commissioner of Police from Cardwell dated August 19,1878 stating that the cutter 'Day Dawn' had one Aboriginal woman and three Aboriginal girls about ten years old, all from Townsville on board. Also Trooper Jacky and deserter Charlie, Dicky Zabberon, Tommy. There are also several letters in the file from Albert Norton, a Magistrate, requesting that this matter be re-investigated; and there are several petitions from residents of the Marlborough district protesting about Sub-Inspector Douglas' order to resign from the Native Police.

Investigation into the death of an Aboriginal man found near Waverley in the St Lawrence area and supposedly shot in the head by Native Police under the command of Sub-Inspector Douglas. The body was difficult to identify but it was thought to be that of an Aboriginal man known as Dicky who was employed by George Fox. Sub-Inspector Douglas' report dated November 21, 1873 also mentions Aboriginal men called Tommy, Billy, Charley and Jimmy, and (another?) incident in which Trooper Billy is reported as shooting Charley. Birch's letter written from Blackall and dated 20 May 1874 mentions Tindare who was his interpreter and was later recovered from Isis Downs Station and then abducted again; also Charley who was killed. In 1870 Birch was involved in an expedition to find traces of the lost explorer Leichhardt and used Kie Kia and Tin dar as interpreters (see letter dated 22nd December 1870). This file includes a number of letters from Birch, which seek to provide further evidence of maltreatment at the hands of the Native Police Force. He accuses the Native Police of abducting four Aboriginal women employed on McKenzie's station in the Lower Thompson as stock riders, one Aboriginal stockman and one (half caste) child. The women's names are listed as Kukia, Ebengera, Tindare (also known as Jenny), and Mary Ann and her child; and Charley. He also accuses troopers Jack and Paddy of murdering Charley; and Wheeler of firing shots into a camp on the Dar Creek. There is a formal list of charges against Wheeler (see letter from Bowen Downs dated 27 March 1871). These charges include the abduction of the four women from McKenzie's station on the Dar Creek, and the murder of Charlie. In answering the charges a number of Aboriginal names are mentioned. These include Kie Kia and Tin dar who were two of the women abducted; Tom Moffet (described as a half caste); Charlie who was murdered; troopers Jacky and Paddy. In the course of this investigation personal details given out about these people include that Tin dar is said to have come from the Warrego about two years ago and that she has been living in Mr



Birch's employ since then; that Kie Kia comes from the lower Warrego, and Charlie also came from the Warrego. There is also mention of a woman with a half-caste child who came from Cunnamulla and has been living with McKenzie since 1863 after her husband was shot. Attached to this letter is a three page list of cases that have come to the Police Magistrate's attention – an Aboriginal woman taken from Kimberley Station by drovers; an Aboriginal boy taken by two men and brought into Normanton and kept by the brother of one of these men – blacksmith Taupe (?); two Aboriginal boys taken by Jimmy Shaw, a publican residing about nine miles from Normanton; Jimmy Shaw also kidnapped an Aboriginal woman; an Aboriginal boy taken by Brannigan, a carrier, travelling between Cloncurry and Normanton; an Aboriginal woman brought to Fort Constantine by Dennis Bourke who



says she was given to him by Fred Gainborni; an Aboriginal woman taken by Daniel Finlay at Jackey's Lagoon.

The file also contains a report on the Native Police stationed at Somerset. Dalrymple makes the observation that the force is inefficient and under strength. "The present 5 a number wholly insufficient for the safety of the settlement and the maintenance of order among the Aborigines". Several of the Native Police troopers are homesick and have requested to be relieved of duty: Andy, Nobby, Peter, Tommy, and a half-caste from Brisbane called Tommy (who was formally a cabman in Brisbane). Dalrymple recommends that due to the thickness of the scrub closely surrounding the settlement and the hostility of the Aboriginals it would be better to let them go and replace them with eight new troopers. Attached to the report is a memorandum of Native Police troopers suggested to the Commissioner of Police for service at Somerset: Charles presently at the Lower Herbert, Fred who served at Gilberton and Townsville, Monday from the Lower Herbert, Davy, Tommy, and Willie (son of Sambo) from Morton Island. The memorandum also advises that if required several of the saltwater aboriginals "... of the Amity Point tribe (formally in the Native Police) can be obtained from Willie's tribe and promised to come". The file also contains: A letter dated December 31, 1869 from Henry Chester at Somerset which mentions that



because the date season has ended earlier than usual and there has been a scarcity of turtles the local Aboriginals have been "sorley straited for food ... I therefore distributed the remainder of the condemned flour among them in payment for cutting and burning off the scrub".

A letter dated November 26, 1874 forwarding requisitions for clothing for the Native Police at Somerset. A report re the shipping, maintenance and fisheries at Somerset in the Torres Strait. A report re the Queensland Government settlement at Somerset and the viability of removing the settlement to Prince of Wales Island, Torres Strait, submitted to the Colonial Secretary for the information of His Excellency the Marquis of Normanby. A map covering the area from the Jardine River on the mainland to Travers Island in the Torres Strait. Letter 67/1955, Top-numbered to 74/2828.

I have no hesitation in saying that the stealing of gins and children from the blacks is a matter of frequent occurrence here". The file also contains correspondence from Ralph Ramsay at Gilberton requesting police protection because the officer in charge of the nearest Native Police camp at Mitton's station does not make any effort to patrol the area. Ramsay is particularly concerned about the Percy River and Robinson River areas because "it is here where the blacks are generally harboured upon the ranges". Balonne River, the Culgoa River and the Warrego River in the district and that withdrawing Native Police protection would put settlers at risk of attack.

Hale also states that "neither do I admit that the government would have any right to imprison them, (so to speak) within the boundaries of the reserve". Hales also comments on the larger goals of Bridgeman's reserve: "natives who have arrived at adult age cannot be changed ... the case is different with the ensuing generation ...the Commissioners have clearly before their minds the course which they wish to pursue for teaching and training the aboriginal children, and Mr Bridgeman's reserve system is a stage of very considerable importance in that course". Page 10 refers to landing on Bayley Island where on the north side "there is a native well and camp" the Captain also comments that "the natives cleared out when they saw us". On page 13 the Captain makes the observation that "the natives in this part of the coast have no canoes but cruise about on V shaped rafts".

Mr Palmer seems anxious to have the blacks in but retires himself to Sydney leaving the risk to his Manager. I fancy he is more anxious to benefit himself than the blacks their labour being very cheap". There is also a letter from Sub-Inspector Brooke of the Walsh River Native Police dated December 20, 1882 reporting that his predecessor, Constable Atteridge had "been trying to come to friendly terms with the natives as ordered, and with this object in view had brought one tribe (Wilming) to the Barracks where they were camped on my arrival". The report also advises that he subsequently removed them and details "depredations" committed by the Aboriginals in the district.

Also mentions there was a Native Police camp 18 miles from Boulia. The file also contains a reply from Inspector Douglas advising that he cannot comment on the state of the Aboriginals in the Burke district because he is unacquainted with the district. However, in the towns of Georgetown, Croydon and Normanton there is very little disease. Douglas also mentions that his views on blankets and work agreements were published in a newspaper article, 28 Feb 1891 – How the Blacks might be civilised. - Trove (nla.gov.au). He states that the beche-de-mer fishermen have shot Aboriginals who would not work for them and on occasions they have been sold to the fishermen. In relation to these allegations he mentions the Johnstone River, Mobray River and Cooktown.

Letter from Archibald Meston thanking the Colonial Secretary for authorising that so many of his pamphlets on the Aboriginals of Queensland should be neatly bound. He advises that one copy has been sent to the Queen, one to Mr Gladstone, one to the Secretary of State and three members of the House of Commons and the anthropological societies. Meston writes that "there is good reason to expect some material assistance from the Imperial Government to any prospectively successful scheme which Queensland may initiate for the preservation of the aboriginals. Attached to the letter is an article from the Courier, which Meston has used as "a fair example of the deeds common in the north and north west". The article describes the attack on Rokeby Station, Cape York Peninsula by Aboriginals and the shooting of several Aboriginals in the conflict. They were then followed up and "further chastised".

Letter from Archibald Meston: "Within the last 10 days I have received 16 letters of sympathy with the aboriginals. I enclose one received yesterday from Roma [not in the file]. It is a condensation of the opinions of the others and a fair expression of the belief of hundreds of intelligent men throughout the colony. I also enclose an extract from today's Telegraph, page 4 [in file]. It is another sample of reports becoming disgracefully frequent. Think of what is behind it!". The article relates to the Aboriginals of the Clark River district who have "adopted rather aggressive tactics towards the whites, and it may be that before long they will have to be dispersed".

Letter from Archibald Meston making some suggestions in relation to the appointment of Aboriginal Protectors: "Dear sir proposal as follows. Thomas Petrie = protector of south Queensland north to say Rockhampton and west. Myself = protector of all north Queensland and west. Both directly



responsible to the Colonial Secretary. Reserves initiated on any scale small or extensive, according to the discretion of the government. Powers of protectors to be clearly defined and their instructions. You will find this proposal command public approval, and Mr Petrie and I will undertake to settle this long continued problem in a manner permanently beneficial to the aboriginals, satisfactory to the government and creditable to the colony". The file also contains articles from the Queenslander, Figaro and the Torres Strait Pilot detailing the plight of the Aboriginals and calling for Archibald Meston to be appointed Protector of Aborigines. The ranges and country are very rough I have directed the Turn Off Lagoon police to make all possible search and inquiries".

Correspondence in the case of Regina v Japardi (Aboriginal). Japardi was tried for manslaughter in the Roma District Court on February 18, 1895 and sentenced to three years in St Helena Gaol. The Judge's report advises that Japardi was convicted of killing another Aborigine named Bally at Mount Margaret Station on Christmas Day 1894. Japardi had worked on the station since he was a boy. The only witness to the crime was a 27-year-old Aboriginal man named Pippo who had also worked on the station since childhood. Pippo's wife is named as Alice. Also mentions an Aboriginal camp on the station and the reason for the murder was that Bally had "pointed the bone" at Japardi. Also mentions Aboriginals Willie and Toby from the camp on Mount Margaret Station.
